Dear Municipal Clerk:

The NJ Division of Purchase & Property has determined that the scope of services of the contract between the State of New Jersey and Ashbritt, Inc. includes sand sifting operations (a/k/a sand processing). Purchasing agents and chief financial officers are encouraged to review the Connecticut Disaster Debris Management Services Contract, which is incorporated into the New Jersey contract and is available on the NJ Division of Purchase & Property web site at:

In particular, representatives of local contracting units should review section D-9 commencing on page 22 of the Connecticut contract (page 69 of the pdf document) for more specific guidance concerning soil, silt, sediment, and sand operations. In addition, the price line for sand sifting operations is located in Supplement 1 of the Connecticut contract (pages 17-18 of the pdf document) and includes a cost for processing material at the TDSRS - \$6.00/cy. The price is the same for any type of processing at the TDSRS (e.g. it is the same costs as separating construction debris from vegetative debris).

Local contracting units are reminded that sand sifting operations are subject to the same method of operation and contingencies that pertain to the other parts of the Ashbritt contract. That is, local contracting units can only use this contract to handle the exigent work. Once the Division of Purchase & Property's RFQ process produces a new debris management contract and sand sifting contract, local contracting units should use that contract. Furthermore, the use of

state contracts in general, including the Ashbritt contract, is not mandatory. Local contracting units can implement other appropriate contracting methods that may be available under the Local Public Contracts Law.
