Read Across America - NJ

For the thirteenth consecutive year, the New Jersey Education Association and the New Jersey State League of Municipalities are working in partnership to promote reading and family literacy through **Read Across America-NJ**. A sample Proclamation and press release are available on the League website.

Read Across America is an annual celebration of reading that culminates this year on March 1, 2013 the day before what would have been the 109th birthday of the late **Theodore Seuss Geisel, aka Dr. Seuss**. Most of us and children throughout our communities know the many fun and valuable books of Dr. Seuss, from *Cat in the Hat* to *Green Eggs and Ham* to *The Places We Go* (a frequent school graduation gift). My personal favorite which I often read to elementary school children is the *Sneetches*, which is fun and a great lesson teacher.

In schools, libraries, and other venues across New Jersey, students, parents, and community members will participate in various events organized by local school employees, and we encourage you to join in the celebration of reading. The simplest way to get involved in **Read Across America** is to volunteer as a guest reader in a local school on March 1.

Other projects to help celebrate **Read Across America** include: Encourage your local governing body to adopt a proclamation designating March 1 as **Read Across America Day** in your community, and invite representatives of the local education association to be present when the resolution is adopted. Or conduct a book drive or donate books on behalf of the local governing body to schools and/or public libraries. Or plan to host a day or evening of family reading in the council chambers. Work with local school staff to organize the event and invite parents.

the Cancelled 2012 Annual League Conference

Thank you for your patience, support and understanding as we managed the cancellation of the 2012 Annual League Conference.

A resolution has been reached with our insurance provider. The League Officers and Executive Board have authorized full refunds on delegate registration fees and meal function fees. Applying refunds as a credit is not authorized. The League will communicate details and refunds directly to the municipal finance department issuing the check, or in the case of personal checks, directly to the person issuing the check. Exhibit space is being managed through a separate process.

Refunds will be mailed from the League office. Due to the volume, we expect to complete the process by April 15, 2013.

We value our partnership and your commitment to New Jersey local government and the Annual League Conference. We look forward to rebuilding New Jersey in 2013 and an excellent 98th Annual League Conference November 19-21, 2013.

We are starting preparations for this year's conference and going forward you will receive normal conference communications on delegate registrations, meal ticket events, and hotel accommodations as you have in the past.



As the Division of Local Government Services (the Division) indicated in its February 27 Local Finance notice (LFN 2013-11), almost all

municipalities should anticipate level aid, when CMPTRA, the Energy Tax and Watershed Aid are added together. In order to avoid the Energy Tax "poison pill," the State will classify more CMPTRA dollars as Energy Tax dollars. This practice (authorized by wording in the budget document that permits the shift "notwithstanding" the requirements of P.L. 1999, Chap. 168) has been used in eight of the past 11 State Fiscal Years.

The proposal would not provide Open Space PILOT funding (\$6.5 million in the State's current budget) to any municipalities during the State's next Fiscal Year. As noted by the Division, funding was distributed last October for use in calendar year 2013 and municipalities can apply it in their 2013 budgets. Going forward, language in the Treasurer's Budget Summary (Section V, page 80) states that municipalities "can anticipate an identical amount (the same as was distributed in October, 2012) in their calendar year 2014 budgets." The League will work with the Administration and the Legislature to ensure continuing funding for those who rely on this revenue.

Recognizing the contributions made by our volunteer first responders and the sacrifices they make to serve their fellow citizens, the League thanks the Governor for proposing a 35% increase in funding for volunteer first aid training. The Emergency Medical Technician Training Fund (EMTTF) was established in 1992 to reimburse EMS volunteer ambulance, first aid and rescue personnel for costs associated with training and testing for those who are seeking certification and re-certification as emergency medical technicians. The funding for the program comes from a diversion of 50 cents from municipal court costs resulting from a violation of motor vehicle laws.

Due to the initial delay in establishing the statutorily required EMTTF Advisory Council and associated regulations, and collection of funds without spending, the EMTTF had carried a surplus since inception. For years, this carry-forward surplus accommodated expenses that exceeded collections. In SFY 2009, the EMTTF retained a \$4M surplus. In December, 2009, the State Treasurer transferred that \$4 million from the EMTTF to the State's General Fund, in order to help offset the

State's budget shortfall. Since then, funding has been limited and reimbursements only available for initial training, not for re-certification.

The League thanks the Governor for this proposal, which will increase the training reimbursement for new volunteers from \$550 to \$750. And the League joins the Governor in thanking our emergency first responders for all they do – not only in terms of urgent care, but also for the property tax relief they provide by their selfless service.

The League is concerned with a proposed diversion of \$21 million from the State Recycling Fund to the General Fund. Beginning on April 1, 2008, a \$3.00 per ton tax is levied on the owner or operator of every solid waste facility as well as on solid waste collectors that transport solid waste for out-of-state disposal. Monies in the fund are used for: direct recycling grants to counties and municipalities; aid to counties for preparing, revising, and implementing solid waste management plans; State recycling program planning and program funding; aid to counties for public information and education programs concerning recycling programs; and for State grants to institutions of higher education to conduct research in recycling. The statute specifies that no less than 60% of the proceeds must be returned as tonnage grants to municipalities and counties. Respectfully, the League asks the Legislature to review that proposed diversion to make certain that our recycling programs get all the support they deserve.

Finally, the League commends the Governor for proposing the establishment of a \$40 million "Sandy contingency fund," to cover recovery costs not funded by the Federal government. As more details become available, the League will provide further analysis.
