





Integrating Emergency Management into Institutions of Higher Education




Protect Yourself and Your Family From Getting Zika

Zika virus spreads to people primarily through the bite of an infected mosquito. The mosquito bites a person infected with the virus. The mosquito then becomes infected and bites another person causing them to become infected. The infected mosquitoes then bite more members of the community and infect them.

These are some of the steps you can take to protect yourself and your family from Zika

- Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants
- Stay in places with window and door screens
- Wear insect repellent
- Use a bed net
- Use condoms or do not have sex

Crisis and Emergency Risk Communication (CERC) is the application of evidence-based principles to effectively communicate during emergencies. These principles are used by public health professionals and public information officers to provide information that helps people make the best possible decisions for themselves and their loved ones.

CDC recently hosted representatives from more than 20 different states for a CERC Train-the-Trainer course. From November 2-4, participants with basic CERC knowledge explored these concepts in more detail, learned strategies for teaching CERC principles to others, and practiced mock presentations. By preparing more people to teach CERC, CDC hopes to provide better access to this training in the future.

During emergencies, responders work under impossible time constraints and must accept the imperfect nature of our choices. CERC materials explain how the right message at the right time can save lives. 

Cyber Monday Shopping Tips - Keep Your Information Secure



The holiday shopping season is upon us. Many people choose to avoid the hassles of traffic and crowds by shopping online, especially on Cyber Monday. However, the Internet is also convenient for criminals, giving them multiple ways to access the personal and financial information of unsuspecting shoppers.

Keep your information secure. Beware of online scams and identity thieves. Review security tips from the [U.S. Computer Emergency Readiness Team](#), such as:


- Do business with reputable vendors – Some attackers may try to trick you by creating malicious websites that appear to be legitimate, so you should verify the legitimacy before supplying any information. (See [Understanding Web Site Certificates](#) for more information.)
- Make sure your information is being encrypted – Many sites use secure sockets layer (SSL) to encrypt information. Indications that your information will be encrypted include a URL that begins with "https:" instead of "http:" and a padlock icon. If the

padlock is closed, the information is encrypted. Some attackers try to trick users by adding a fake padlock icon, so make sure that the icon is in the appropriate location for your browser.

- Be wary of emails requesting information – Attackers may attempt to gather information by sending emails requesting that you confirm purchase or account information. (See [Avoiding Social Engineering and Phishing Attacks.](#)) Legitimate businesses will not solicit this type of information through email. Do not provide sensitive information through email. If you receive an unsolicited email from a business, instead of clicking on the provided link, directly log on to the authentic website by typing the address yourself. (See [Recognizing and Avoiding Email Scams.](#))
- Use a credit card – There are laws to limit your liability for fraudulent credit card charges, but you may not have the same level of protection for your debit cards. Also use a credit card when using a payment gateway such as PayPal, Google Wallet, or Apple Pay.

Celebrate the Holidays Safely



Cooking, candles, decorations, electrical cords, and heating devices, are all things you can expect at a winter holiday party, but, they're also fire hazards. Keep your holiday parties safe with these U.S. Fire Administration (USFA) tips:

- Test your smoke alarms and tell your guests about your home fire escape plan.
 - Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
 - Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking at high temperatures; like frying, grilling or broiling.
 - Ask people who smoke to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them, so young children don't touch them.
 - Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Thoroughly wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.

Winter Safety for Senior Citizens



Did you ever hear a parent tell a child to put on a coat before they catch a cold? That's because just being really cold can make you very sick, and it's not limited to kids. The National Institute on Aging (NIA) says older adults can lose body heat fast—faster than when they were young. A big chill can turn into a dangerous problem before an older person even knows what's happening. NIA has a brochure, [Stay Safe in Cold Weather!](#) with tips on how to stay warm when it's cold. Here are a few of the tips they recommend:

- Set your heat at 68 degrees or higher.
- Dress warmly on cold days even if you are staying in the house.
- Wear loose layers when you go outside on chilly days. Wear a hat, scarf, and gloves.
- Don't stay out in the cold and wind for a long time.
- Talk to your doctor about health problems that may make it harder for you to keep warm.
- Find safe ways to stay active even when it's cold outside.
- Ask a neighbor or friend to check on you if you live alone.
- If you think someone has hypothermia, call 911 right away. Cover him or her with a blanket. Don't rub his or her

legs or arms.




This 15-page briefing paper discusses the link between antibiotic use on farms and the spread of antibiotic resistance to human populations, summarizes the state of the problem, discusses the crisis of antibiotic resistance, and informs policy makers of the risks and benefits of taking action or not. Because nearly 80 percent of antimicrobial use in the United States is in livestock, the document recommends doing a better job of reducing antibiotic use in livestock as well as in humans.





Building Resilience in Critical Infrastructure



FEMA implementing new Public Assistance program in Georgia



FEMA and the [Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency](#) will implement the second stage of the new model for delivering the FEMA Public Assistance (PA) program during recovery operations from Hurricane Matthew. Georgia will be the third state to participate in the phased process implementation as FEMA creates a more streamlined approach to providing disaster assistance. FEMA fully implemented the new PA delivery model for the first time in the State of Oregon this past spring. Through extensive feedback from the Oregon and external partners, FEMA incorporated recommendations into the new delivery model that will be used in Georgia. Beta testing of the model was also conducted in 2015 in Iowa. The Stage 2 implementation for Georgia will include using the new Customer Relations Management Tool, which is a web-based tracking system applicants use to upload required project documentation.

NWS realignment plan announced — IAEM webinar with NWS Deputy Director set for Nov. 18



The National Weather Service (NWS) recently announced it is considering ways to realign staff and functions “to deliver weather forecasts and warnings more effectively.” On Nov. 1, NWS [released a statement](#) broadly outlining the intentions and rationale behind their realignment plan. Since local forecasting is critically important to the emergency management community, IAEM staff and leadership will be closely monitoring and providing feedback to NWS during development, testing, and implementation of the plan to ensure there is no degradation of the service we have come to expect from NWS. IAEM has arranged for NWS Deputy Director Laura Furgione to conduct a webinar to brief interested members about the details of the realignment proposal and to answer our initial questions. ASPR publishes 2017-2022 Health Care Preparedness and Responses Capabilities



The [2017-2022 Health Care Preparedness and Response Capabilities](#) document, recently released by the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response (ASPR), outlines the high-level objectives that the U.S. health care delivery system, including health care coalitions (HCCs) and individual health care organizations, should undertake to prepare for, respond to, and recover from emergencies. These capabilities illustrate the range of preparedness and response activities that, if conducted, represent the ideal state of readiness in the United States. The document was finalized after the agency reviewed more than 1800 written comments.

CDC adds \$44M to emergency preparedness funds



The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has increased by \$44.25 million the Public Health Emergency Preparedness cooperative agreements for all-hazards preparedness efforts in 2016 and 2017, as noted by a news release. The funds will go to a total of 62 jurisdictions, including U.S. states, cities and territories.

CERT training for the deaf makes history in Georgia



Community Emergency Response Basic Training for the deaf was recently offered at the Newnan Police Headquarters. For three days, Georgia Emergency Management Agency-certified instructors were able to present information exclusively in American Sign Language to ensure hearing-impaired citizens are equipped with basic skills needed for emergency readiness. **READ MORE**



FEMA announces the availability of Hazus 3.2 software to assist in estimating impacts of disasters



As part of its ongoing modernization effort, the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Hazus team on Oct. 31 deployed Hazus 3.2, available for free download on the FEMA Flood Map Service Center [Hazus Download page](#). Hazus is a nationally applicable standardized methodology that contains models for estimating potential losses from earthquakes, floods, and hurricanes. Hazus uses Geographic Information Systems (GIS) technology to estimate physical, economic, and social impacts of disasters. It graphically illustrates the limits of identified high-risk locations due to [earthquake](#), [hurricane](#) and [floods](#). Users then can visualize the spatial relationships between populations and other more permanently fixed geographic assets or resources for the specific hazard being modeled, a crucial function in the pre-disaster planning process. The new version includes an ArcGIS upgrade, integration of the Hazus earthquake module with the U.S. Geological Survey's ShakeMap, and enhanced reports. 
