PROCLAMATION Honoring Apraxia Awareness Day

WHEREAS, May 14, 2015 marks the third annual Childhood Apraxia of Speech Day, during which awareness will be raised about Childhood Apraxia of Speech, a particularly difficult, persistent, and severe speech and communication disorder in youngsters; and

WHEREAS, Childhood Apraxia of Speech (CAS) causes children to have extreme difficulty learning to speak and is among the most severe of speech and communication problems in children; and

WHEREAS, the act of learning to speak comes effortlessly to most children, those with apraxia endure an incredible and lengthy struggle; and

WHEREAS, that without appropriate intervention, children with apraxia are then placed at high risk for secondary impact in literacy and other school-related skills; and

WHEREAS, that most children with apraxia of speech will learn to communicate with their very own voices only if they receive early intervention and appropriate, frequent speech therapy; and

WHEREAS, that it is imperative there be greater public awareness about childhood apraxia of speech at the local, state and federal level.

NOW THEREFORE, be it proclaimed that I, Robert Greenbaum, Mayor of Mount Olive Township do hereby proclaim May 14, 2015 as "Apraxia Awareness Day" in the Township of Mount Olive.

It was a great job, so I was very thankful. That's all I have.

Legislative Committee Report

Planning Board Report

Mr. Mania: On the Legislative end, for that BPU meeting, I had called our Legislators and asked if they would attend that meeting supporting the residents of Country Oaks and I was told by their office that they don't go to those meetings. I was very disappointed I've got to tell you. I mean, they're our Legislators, they're representing the people, what do you mean you don't go to those meetings. Planning Board, I couldn't go to that meeting because I couldn't vote, but I will be at the next meeting.

President Nicastro: Thank you. Anyone from the public wish to be heard? Mr. Weiss, that was just for you.

Mr. Mania: You're a busy guy tonight, Howie.

PUBLIC PORTION

Mr. Howie Weiss: I'm here, I may as well speak. I urge caution to the Council. Alex, I'm going to follow up on your comment. Before you play this issue of background checks out in the court of public opinion, you need to consider who might respond to you. I think that the general public, the people who have children and really don't get involved are going to make an assumption that their elected officials are going to do the right thing. I think people who are going to show up at a meeting like that are the people who have certain interests, certain...maybe they're supporting friends or I'm not really sure. I'm going to give you an example, I'm going to give you a very good example on why you have to be careful, why not to take it out to the public in a matter of...I know you have to promote it and announce it and make it public, but to give you an example, years ago I was the President of the Flanders Crossing Homeowners Association and for those that know the community, there's a tennis court right in the center and the tennis court is surrounded by about ten homes. Of the two hundred and thirty some odd homes, about 200 people wanted those tennis courts lit. As the President that came in front of the Board and I kind of led the objection that there's no way we're lighting the tennis courts, the people said we want it and we're going to get a majority. At the end of the day, the leader of this pro light committee went to 220 homes and got people to sign. Most people sign because they don't want anybody at their door, they sign, go away from me, but they didn't go to the fifteen or 10 people, whatever number of

people who lived around the tennis courts, whose lives would be negatively impacted by lights shining in their homes on a tennis court that's really not necessary. As the President of that Association, I kind of said your data is skewed and the fact that 210 people want it is not going to favor the Board to do something that's only good...that's going to severely affect 10 people. Again, I understand that there's a public obligation to notice what's going to go on, but to go overboard and to start causing or playing this out in the court of public opinion, I think it's a bad thing to do. I think you need to just follow the process, notice it in the newspaper, announce it like you do every other business and wait to see what happens.

Mr. Mania: The public can come to the meeting and object if they want.

Mr. Weiss: They can. I think if you make a special deal about it, you're going to hear from special interest groups and I don't think that's...from the Council, you ultimately need to do the right thing, not what's publicly, not what the majority wants, but what the right thing is.

President Nicastro: Mr. Roman.

Mr. Roman: Howie, I think you would agree that if I were to do what the public says I would not have voiced my opposition. I am pretty certain that when I put the call out for input that overwhelming numbers are going to support this Ordinance.

Mr. Weiss: I agree with you. Alex, I agree with you.

Mr. Roman: The fact, the fact that I am seeking public input because these are the people who are going to be affected and I for one would want to hear pro or con as to what this may or may not do and affect their lives. I'm almost...I'm pretty certain that it will be if I were to tally it up, it would be 99.9 % of people would say whatever we have to do to protect our children because it is very easy to sell something when you bill it as this it to protect our children, but...

Mr. Weiss: Alex, I agree with you.

Mr. Roman: ...there might be the few that'll be out there that says I'm all for protecting our children, but why is another intrusive layer of government going into my life.

Mr. Weiss: I think you do a very good job on your Facebook page when you evoke opinions, but in this case, I started by saying I urge caution by what you do with these opinions because there's really only one thing that should matter, doing the right thing regardless of what outspoken masses might say. That's my only point.

President Nicastro: Mr. Mania.

Mr. Mania: Yes. Alex, I hate to say this, but it's almost like you want to protect the people that shouldn't be there and that is really bothersome to me.

Mr. Roman: I understand you perceive it as such, but trust me, it is not the case. I have coached for well over 15 to 20 years and I know of a couple of people that I have coached along side with that were excellent coaches, were great with these kids, that unfortunately had issues in their past and that in no way whatsoever effected their ability to teach a kid how to throw a football, how to receive a ground ball and I just worry that in this furor, to go in there and pass legislation because it's codified as protecting our children, just like I can think of previously before, we talked about lowering speed limits and we were...I can't recall who it was but wanted to lower the speed limits throughout the Township to 20 or 25 miles an hour because it would protect the children.

Mr. Mania: This is a whole different situation.

Mr. Roman: I understand, but I want to hear from people who may or may not be affected by this and I would be doing a disservice to not only this body, but to the residents of Mount Olive if I did not at least hear from the people who will be affected by this Ordinance. I am...I do not base my opinions on tally numbers and whether it's 51% that's voting in favor one way or the other. I am a representative, I represent the people of Mount Olive and in the end I will have the final say based on the input of people on the subject that maybe I'm not too conversed on, but I want to hear from the residents.

Mr. Weiss: Alex, I agree with what you're saying and I like to hear what you're saying, if you expand the concept, many of you know that I'm the Chairman of the Planning Board and just the other day, yesterday, Joe and I were talking about an issue when ignorance, and I don't mean that in a bad way, when people don't know the facts and they kind of fill in the blanks with their own opinion and now they're creating a situation that isn't

even close and Joe, I'm trying to think about what we talked about yesterday with a resident who had no idea what the facts were and made a claim and was attacking Joe about an issue down at Marveland Farms and I think the public needs to have the facts before you ask their opinion...

Mr. Roman: That is why I want to have at least a link of this proposed Ordinance so that they could...

Mr. Weiss: Good idea.

Mr. Roman: ...have the facts.

Mr. Weiss: That's a much smarter idea, Alex than simply posting it on Facebook and saying hey, Council is going to hear an Ordinance that's going ban...you could do it with drama, you can do it with...anyway you do it that's kind of what I'm saying we not do. Sean made a reference to the Mayor's Facebook page, I've seen you do it in a very positive way, I'm not judging. I think this is an issue that is a little bit different and I think that we might want to educate if you're going to send out the message. Linking it to the...if there's a PDF, I like that.

Mr. Roman: That is my intention. That's why I requested a digital version of it.

Mr. Weiss: Good idea.

Mr. Roman: Thank you.

Mr. Mania: You know Alex, its unfortunate, but sometimes we have to pay for the sins of our past and like you said, you committed a sin 20 years ago, so one day it catches up with you. It's unfortunate, but it does happen.

Mr. Roman: Being Catholic, I'm sure you agree that sins are forgivable.

Mr. Mania: I was going to become a priest.

President Nicastro: He's Sicilian. Anyway. Any Council Comments? Mr. Amianda.
